





Salt Stories: A Correspondence with the Dimalayas

Salt. Most people nowadays don't give enough credit to that fine grain crystal. Today, you just ask someone to pass the salt to you and they hand it over without a second thought. Salt in the modern age is just a bag or cylindrical can one picks up at the grocery store. Hell, you can even grab a handful of packets at your local drive thru.

Not so in my day. You see, way back when, salt was a commodity that built empires, caused massive wars, and made some civilizations disappear.

I started my life out as many did, as just some dust. As the years passed by, I slowly I grew. Today, you might recognize me; I'm one of the peaks in the Himalayan mountains. I can tell you this, though, things have changed.

You humans have been in search of salt since the beginning of your time. It fascinates me to no end of what you've been willing to do to claim it as yours...

In the early stages of human civilization, man realized what bodies needed to survive. Proteins and leafy greens. Water was always important, like it is for all life. You also learned how important salt was. Without it, humans die. Yet, you don't seem that impressed with it anymore. Let me remind you though, that without salt you will surely perish.

Your earliest written record of salt production dates around 800 B.C., however, let's go back to a time before your recorded history. The Chinese have one of the earliest verifiable saltworks in prehistoric times.

In the northern province of Shanxi there is a lake of salty water, Lake Yuncheng. It is an arid region of dry yellow earth (and one of my oldest friends). This area was known for its constant warfare amongst you humans. All fought over control of the lake. By 6000 B.C., each year when the lake's waters evaporated in the summer sun, humans flocked to the area to harvest the square crystals in the surface of the water. You would refer to this as "dragging and gathering."

Humans have fought and schemed to control salt. The Chinese put in place a salt tax, implementating this tax numerous times throughout history to bolster their coffers and pay for their armies. A substance needed by all humans for good health, even mere survival, would indeed make a great tax generator. This salt tax was so immense, it helped build the Great Wall.

The Egyptians used the purest of sea salts to preserve their dead. To them, a dead body was the vessel connecting Earthly life to the afterlife. Eternal life could be maintained by the sculptured image of a person or by repetition of the deceased's name, but the *ideal* option was to have the body permanently preserved.


Even before the great Egyptian civilization and the rule of the mighty Pharos, the Egyptians preserved their dead with salt. Before the hieroglyphs showed on walls, cadavers were buried and so well preserved that over 5,000 years later they are being dug up from these early burial sites with flesh and skin. They are not mummies; it's all due to the fact that the burial sites are in the dry salty desert sand in which they lay in peace.

Salt was and is a great commodity which should not be taken for granted like it is today. You have so *many* wondrous varieties of salt, yet you consume the tiny little granules that contain almost nothing of what salt has contained for eons of generations.

There is a tribe of Vikings (as you call them) perfectly preserved deep within a salt cave as I tell you this. Alas, that is a story for another time...



A TALE OF JEALOUSY AND BETRAYAL

This traditional Scottish ballad tells the tale of two sisters, one whos fatal jealousy has been sung or told many times. The theme of this ballad was common in many northern European languages. At least 21 English variants exist under several names that are similar to this version and there are 125 Swedish variants! This ballad is still being produced today, most notably in Lorena McKennitt's song 'The Bonny Swans'.

There cam a knight to be their wooer, By the bonnie milldams o' Binnorie.

He courted the eldest with glove and ring, But he lo'ed the youngest abune a' thing.

From Seed to Cloth: A Lecture on Medieval Europe's Linen Production

When someone thinks about going out on a Friday night, they imagine going out with their friends or significant other, drinking, dining, dancing, whathaveyou. For me, on the night of September 6th, I went to a lecture presented by the Medieval Fair of Norman and the OU Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies instead, taught by none other than Namron's own Mistress Vigdis Gráfeldr.

In true SCAdian fashion, I was a little late. When I walked into the room at the Central Norman Library, the lights were out and Vigdis was already showing medieval art showcasing linen production. I was overjoyed to see that the room was quite full with people eager to learn about this ancient art.



It's always surprising to me how artists chose to capture tasks such as linen production. Vigdis was able to highlight linen production in art several times over, pointing out the different tools and production methods that were used. She also demonstrated how little linen production methods had changed. Displaying tools from the early 20th century, she was able to show that they were almost identical to those used 400-600 years previously.

Not only were we presented with a lecture on medieval linen production, Mistress Vigdis gave us a demonstration. With flax that had been grown in her backyard, she went through the steps from shaft to thread.

To turn flax into linen is an arduous task, taking both time and strength to turn straw into fiber.

In order to start this time consuming process, one must first sow flax seed into a deeply plowed field. Flax was sowed by hired professionals because it was such a critical task. These professionals would use certain rhythms and patterns as they threw the seed so that it was evenly dispersed.

Once it was ready, the plants were harvested by hand. When flax linen is harvested it is pulled, rather than cut in order to obtain the longest fiber. Also, when the roots are left intact the plant withstands being stooked better for a period of time. The harvest season begins about one month after the flax begins blooming. Understandably, the flax harvest was a very strenuous activity.

In order for the flax linen to dry it was bundled together and tied. These bundles are called 'beets' and are stooked (set upright in a field with their heads <u>together</u>) until they are entirely dry. By stooking the flax it dried evenly, verses laying it out in the sun. Higher quality fiber turned white when it dried, while the lesser turned brownish.



Once the stooks were dried, The top ends of the dry bundles of flax are pulled through nails hammered into a board, like a comb. This is called 'rippling'. The seeds are collected below on a sheet. At this point the flax can be stored for a while as long as it is kept dry.



But the fiber that makes linen doesn't come from the seed of the plant. It comes from the stalk. In order to obtain these fibers, the plant must be 'retted'. Retting is the process of rotting away the inner stalk using bacteria, leaving the outer fibers intact. The bacteria decomposes the pectin in the stalks, which binds the stalk and fibers together, allowing the fibers to be freed without damaging them. The bacteria is active in a hot moist environment, but if left too long in this environment the fibers themselves will also rot, ruining the flax. The water is changed or the flax rinsed periodically for four to five days until the retting process is finished.



Once the fibers are loosened by retting the process of breaking is used to break up the inner woody stalk into smaller pieces so that it is separated from the flax. This is done by putting handfuls of flax into the wooden blades of a breaking machine and beating the flax from the bottom of the stalk to the top. The broken wood fragments, called 'shives' fall through the fiber to the ground.



The broken shives that do not fall to the ground must be 'scutched' out. This is done by swinging a wooden scutching knife down the flax which scrapes it and pulls away the shives that remain. Mistress Vigdis lamented that she left her scutching knife at home. She was able to improvise with the wooden bottom of her bag. There were several images of this stage being performed, showing the different ways people throughout the ages adapted to protect their hands from this process.



Once the scutching process is done, the fibers must be prepared for spinning. In order to do this, the fibers must go through a hackeling process.

First it is pulled through a hackle with nails spaced fairly far apart to remove the straw and then the hackles with nails close together would polish and split the fibers.

The fibers that come off on the hackle are bundled to provide a lower quality product still of some value (such a burlap, below left), while the hackled



flax that remains intact is cleaned once more and achieves a gloss and suppleness which makes it ideal for spinning (below right).





The difference between commercial fibers and the fibers processed from Vigdis's private stock is apparent. The strands are much longer, but the quality is the same. If you note the difference in color, that is from the rhetting process. Once spun and woven, both will come out white.

Depending on the preference of the spinner, flax linen can either be spun from a distaff, or the spinner may simply lay flax fibers in their lap. From this point on, much of the process is the same as that for wool. The longer strands are more desirable. They give better strength to the thread.





One of the things that stuck out to me during the discussion on spinning the flax was that the fiber that was spun on drop spindle is considered 'better' than that spun on a wheel.

Wheel spun flax is weaker & less consistent than that spun with a drop spindle. The importance of this is that you want smooth and strong thread to produce a good warp while weaving to create a more durable piece of fabric.



The introduction of the spinning wheel into linen production was a boone, however. The wheel made linen more readily available to the masses which, in turn, freed up the bottleneck of cloth production. The surprising consequence of this was that with the increased production of linen rags also freed up the bottleneck in paper production. The increase in availability in paper dramatically lowered the price which then led to the introduction of printing by Gutenberg, the production of cheap

books and broadsheets, and provided the opportunity for universal education and a basis for modern democracy.

After all the flax has been spun, it's time to weave! It was woven on a loom or a frame to produce linen fabric (right). Linen prefers to be woven in dampness. It behaves better and is less wiry. The key to a good weave is tension. Once it is taken off the loom, it looks and feels like burlap. In order to get it to that nice linen look, it must be hard pressed or mangled.

Once you have your fabric, it is laid out to bleach (below). Linen is naturally tan. Once it is bleached, it can be dyed any color. There were several methods of bleaching that were used; lye in various strengths, cow dung, cow urine, human urine, buttermilk, fermented bran, sour milk, and so on. After the chosen solution was used, the linen was laid out on the grass and dried by the sun.





There is a lot of hard work and love that goes into making linen. Much more than I had ever dreamed of until getting to sit through Mistress Vigdis's lecture and demonstration. I have a new respect for this fabric (and it's price tag).

Vigdis has realistic dreams for her personal linen production. Her goal is to make and wear a hat that she has created. Not just simply from fabric that she gets at the store, but from the very earth in her backyard.





Society Vocabulary Explained!

General Terms

Crash Space – informal lodgings with members of the group holding an event. **Dayboard** – lunch, served at some events.

Demo – a demonstration of the activities in the SCA. SCA participants will usually perform martial activities as well as arts and sciences for the public.

Dry/Damp/Wet Site – alcoholic beverage policies. Dry sites allow no alcohol. Damp sites permit wine, beer, and mead, but no hard liquor. Wet sites do not restrict alcohol. "Discreetly" damp or wet means that the site is normally dry, but the owners will permit alcohol as long as the labeled containers are kept out of sight and are removed at the end of the event. Of course, at any site, local laws regarding alcohol consumption must be followed.

Event – any Society gathering. You're welcome to go to any that are listed in the newsletter. You can take part in the activities, although some (mainly martial arts) take special training, and you'll need to be "authorized" by a marshal before you can take part in those.

Farspeaker – slang sometimes used for "telephone".

Feast – an elaborate meal, usually served in the evening, sometimes accompanied by entertainment.

Feast Gear – a place setting for a feast: at least a plate, bowl, goblet, spoon and knife. You can also include a napkin, fork, tablecloth, candles, etc. Assume you'll need to bring basic feast gear for any feast unless the announcement says you don't.

Garb – clothing based on that worn in the Middle Ages or Renaissance. Required at all events except some local meetings and activities – but your first attempt doesn't have to be fancy! Many local chapters have loaner garb – contact their Chatelain(e).

Gate – the place to check in or buy at-the-door admission to an event.

Gold Key – a collection of loaner garb and gear for the use of newcomers, generally maintained by the Chatelain(e).

Halflings – children (or sometimes, "smalls"). The terms come from modern fictional works. In the Middle Ages, children were referred to as ... children.

Heavy Weapons – combat done by armored fighters, with rattan versions of swords, polearms, and spears.

HOLD! - a cry meaning "Stop whatever you are doing and freeze in place until you see where the hazard is!" Normally used during combat, but it's been extended to cover all forms of activity.

Household – a voluntary association of friends or people with a common interest. Can be organized under whatever rules the members jointly accept. Households have no formal standing in the SCA.

Light Weapons - in some kingdoms, refers to rapier combat (fencing).

Lists / List Field - the roped-off area for combat. Also called "the eric" in the West Kingdom. The List Table is the location where competitors sign in and where the Minister of Lists keeps track of the paperwork necessary to actually run the tournament.

Melee – martial combat with many participants on each side.

Plume has been released. I hope this will be a useful resource for the barony!




From the Thrown Weapons Marshal


