### boney-slazed Carrocs and Parsnips

From Lady Ophelia Warde, in her continuing series of Norse recipes in honor of Their Excellencies, Baron Micolay and Baronowa Ulliana

This makes a dramatically pretty dish, the snowy parsnips contrasting with the orange of the carrots. I like to use smaller carrots (not peeled baby carrots, but smaller, slender whole carrots) and leave them whole. It's hard to find truly small parsnips, so you may have to slice them lengthwise in half, or even quarters. (If they are very large don't hesitate to dig out the hard pith in the middle.) Peeled sliced beets, red or golden, make a nice addition/substitution, too. Put them in the pan when you start the carrots.

Root vegetables such as these were set in iron or soapstone pans, with hot wood coals heaped up outside the pan to the rim, and demanded little attention from the busy cook except an occasional stir to keep them from sticking.

- 1 pound slender carrots, scrubbed or lightly peeled, left whole
- 1 pound parsnips, scrubbed or peeled, cut in half lengthwise, or quarters if truly large
- 3 Tbsp butter (more if needed)
- 1 Tbsp honey
- 6 mint leaves, lightly torn or chopped
- 1. Melt the butter under medium low heat in a large heavy skillet.
- 2. Add the peeled or scrubbed carrots first, as they take longer to cook than the parsnips. Push the carrots about in the butter until they are coated, and after 5 minutes, add the parsnips.
- 3. Cover the skillet and keep it over medium-low heat, stirring every once in a while to check they are not browning too quickly. It will take about 20 minutes for them to be tender.
- 4. Dribble in the honey and give the vegetables a final stir to make sure all are anointed.
- 5. Remove to a serving dish and snip or tear the mint leaves over all.

Easily serves six, unless you are a rabbit.

Mint is such a strong grower. It's practically a weed. In fact, in my garden it is a weed, which is why I like to use it every chance I can. Its cooling spiciness is the perfect foil for the sweetness of the vegetables.

<u>Myth</u>: You have to have an AoA to register a device

**False**: You can register a device at any time.

<u>Myth</u>: If you register a name for a particular time period, you have to wear the clothes from that time period

<u>**True and False</u>**: You can register a Celtic name and only wear Celtic clothes OR you can register a 16th century Italian name, and wear Viking, Turkish, Celtic, and anything else your heart desires. How you dress and play is 100% up to you</u>

**Myth**: There are certain things you can not put on your device. **True**: There are certain charges that are reserved for certain groups or people. Also, there are certain charges that are not allowed due to mundane use or offensiveness.

**Myth**: You can only register one name and device.

For some of our populace members, this will be their first trek to Mississippi to experience this annual 4 kingdom event. I was wondering what some of our hardened GW veterans have learned to take (and what to leave at home), so I asked the populace for their MUST HAVES and HAVE NOTS. Here are some of the things they said:

- Baby Wipes they "Make life so much easier when you don't have time to hop in the shower (Cuz it's full or just short on time in general) and you need to feel refreshed"
- 2. Rain Boots (or other shoes good for rain and mud). This was mentioned a few times. As well as other good shoes for walking. Cause there's A LOT of walking.
- 3. HAND WARMERS This was mentioned over and over, including the larger warmers to throw into sleeping bags to help warm up feet

- Rain ponchos/umbrella it's gonna rain, y'all. And the umbrella can double as a portable sunshade
- A bag or tote to keep your clothes dry - I'm seeing a theme...
- 6. A battery powered fan for the tent

#### Medieval Terms of Eudearmeuc

**myne owne hertis rote**: literally 'my own heart's root'. Rote in Middle English, referring to the roots of a plant or tree, could (as in Modern English) be used figuratively to mean the depths of something, its inmost part. So this means 'you who are at the very centre of my heart'.

my sweeting: 'my sweet one'.

*my darling*: 'my dear one' (actually *dear-ling*, 'dear little one'). A similar word, *deoring*, 'dearing' also exists, but didn't stand the test of time. *Dereworthy darling* ('precious darling') is also a fairly common phrase.

culver: 'dove'. (And also, dove itself).

*my honey:* yep, totally medieval. (See *William of Palerne*, l.1655). One of the MED citations is a line from a religious poem, "Jesu, my hony swete, My herte!"

#### Some affectionate terms for a child:

miting: 'little mite'

youngling: 'young one'

*dillydoun*: This is apparently related to the Old Icelandic *dilla* 'to lull' and *dillindo*, 'lullaby'. The one appearance of it in Middle English is from the Towneley Plays, from fifteenth-century Yorkshire:

A pratty child is he As syttys on a wamans kne; A dyllydowne, perde, To gar a man laghe.

[A pretty child is he, as sits on a women's knee; a *dillydown*, indeed, to cause a man to laugh]
