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
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From the Seneschal

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INTROOUCTION TO FINGERLOOD BRAIOING

By Masina Da Ferrara [Update March 17, 2020]

In the European Middle Ages and the Renaissance, braids made by a fingerloop method were extremely common.¹ Fingerloop braiding was the most important production method for braided laces and bands and has been exercised by both professional craftsmen as well as in monasteries and private homes.² A fingerloop braid was one of the more widely known and often used for purse strings. It also served as decorative edges, either sewn directly onto the hem of the garment.³ Fingerloop braiding is also known as a finger-held braiding technique requiring no assistance of tools except for an optional beater.⁴




Figure 2 Identifying letter on each finger Source: Nutz, Beatrix, 2014, p. 127

One of the most common loop braids is a 5-loop braiding (Figure 1). There are 3 different traditional fingerloop braiding methods for making these braids: the **A-fell** and **V-fell** methods, and a third method called **Slentre**⁵. According to the modern directions, each finger is identified by a letter: A, B, C, and D (Figure 2). "A-fell" and "V-fell" was introduced in Old English Pattern Books for Loop Braiding by Noémi Speiser. 6 In both "A-fell" and "V-fell" methods your palms generally face each other. An index finger (A finger) is an

operation for the A-fell method. The ring finger (C Finger) or little finger (D Finger) is an operation for the V-fell method. The Slentre loop braiding method is done with the palms facing down. The index finger (A finger) is the active braiding finger or operation. This technique is also called as Faroese cords.⁷ The braiding techniques were used to produce cords for Norse Greenland garments. A square braid is the most common one. However, this article emphasizes the A-fell method mainly.

To make a braid with the A-fell method, you exchange the loops, one at a time, between two hands in a particular sequence. One end of the bunched braiding threads is fixed on a support, and each loop is mounted on a finger of the hands. To learn more about different braiding directions, you can access modern directions from a book, Tak V Bowes Departed: A 15th Century Braiding Manual Examined." By Benns, E., & Barrett as well as online access of "Tollemache Book of Secrets", A 15th-century household book belonging to Lady Catherine Tollemache" of Cindy Myers. The original is privately owned by the Tollemache family. It contains directions for 64 braids⁸. In this article, you will learn how to braid "A Broad Lace" (Figure 1). This is one of the easiest and most common of the finger loop braids. According to Cindy Myers, the modern directions of A Broad Lace from Tollemache Book of Secrets are as shown below.

Take five loops, and place them on the following fingers:

Left hand: A B C

Right hand: **B** C

Work with the **right** hand:

A goes through **B** right, and takes the loop on **C** left reversed.

Lower the left loops.

Work with the **left** hand:

A goes through **B** left, and takes the loop on **C** right reversed.

Lower the right loops.

Repeat from the beginning.




Figure 3 Each step of a 5-loop braiding Source: Crowfoot, Elisabeth, Frances Pritchard, and Kay Staniland, 2006: p.139.

You can also observe the demonstration of each step from Step A to G in Figure 3. The first step starts with setting up.

The following section is another modern instruction for braiding a 5-loop braiding with an A-fell method. To learn more about the directions in detail, you can read more information in Tak V Bowes Departed Book page 34-38. These modern instructions of a Broad Lace of 5 Loops include written instructions and diagrams. I received the permission of the author to share this information with you.

Modern Instructions

To achieve the color braid as shown in Figure 1, 3 red loops and 2 yellow loops are required.




Figure 4 Steps of braiding a broad lace

<u>Step A</u> is a diagram that demonstrates how to place all loops. Put a (yellow) loop on B finger and C finger on the right-hand. Put a (red) loop on A, B, and C finger on the left-hand (Figure 4).

<u>Step 1</u> A on the right-hand side goes through B on the same side and take loop C on the left-hand side and reversed it. To reverse a loop, you can see in Figure 5 below.

<u>Step 2</u> Lower the left-loops from B to C and A to B.

<u>Step 3</u> A on the left-hand side goes through loop B on the same side to take loop C from the right-hand side and reversed it.

Step 4 Lower the right loops from B to C and A to B.

Begin again

I am all about easy activities and ones that don't require me to go buy more supplies. So I found some simple, kinda silly, but fun activities for the girls and I to do. We wanted to share these with you so you and your younglings can have a little easy fun.

Dragon Hunt

I know many of us, or our kids, love dragons. So this one is cheesy, yet easy. Basically, it's an Easter egg hunt! Hide pictures of dragons or a toy dragon around a room, yard or house. Have your 'knights' go on a dragon hunt.

To add a little more fun, let them take any toy swords, shields, or helmets as the go for the hunt. And you, as the parent can be the one needing rescued while you sit and watch them hunt all the dragons.

HOW TO MAKE A STAINED GLASS CRAFT FOR KIDS



This project will take a little more work and items. This can help brighten any window! To make a stained glass craft you'll need:

Wax paper
Scissors for kids
Tape
Glue
Black construction paper (or black tape)
Tissue paper in various colors

Cut the tissue paper into small 1'' - 2'' pieces. You can make a variety of shapes including rectangles, triangles and squares.

Cut the black construction paper into eight 1/2 inch strips (makes two windows). Save the rest of construction paper to make bars or shadow shapes in the stained glass windows.

Use the black construction paper strip to determine the length of your wax paper. Cut a square piece of wax paper off the roll based upon the length of your construction paper strip. Our stained glass windows were about 10.5 inches square.

Tape the wax paper to the construction paper on the underside of the paper and turn it underside up.

Children can add tissue paper to the underside of the window using glue or tape.

Once all the glue is dried, hang the stained glass window on a window with the underside against the window.

The light will show through revealing the stained glass window design.



Those are a couple things my family has planned. If you have some, share in the group.

One last thing, we are still planning on Beltane and hope we don't have to cancel. I'm looking for helpers for our activities that we have planned. We will be learning about a few cities near Mt. 






Artwork for the New Pavilion
